A personality isn't static; it is an inconsistent change. In Identity, Youth & Crisis, he presents eight stages of psychosocial development. Each stage becomes a crisis, (94) because incipient growth and awareness in a significant part function [sic] go together with a shift in instinctual energy and yet also causes a specific vulnerability in that part`.

The initial step is Trust versus Question, current in a phase of life. Here, the child builds up a feeling of baby p trust towards its parental figures or a feeling of doubt on the off chance that the individual discovers them to be inconsistent. The subsequent advance is Autonomy versus child stage, trailed by Disgrace and Doubt in a little Initiative versus Blame, and Industry versus Mediocrity.
