The SVU-International Journal of Medical Sciences is published by the Faculty of Medicine, South Valley University since. Starting from 2017, one volume comprising two issues (January and July) is published each year

Articles submitted to the **SVU-IJMS** are accepted on the basis that they are solely to the **Journal** and are subject to editorial revision. The Journal will not consider for publication papers that have been published or are being under consideration elsewhere. Manuscripts, tables, diagrams and photographs become the property of the **Journal** and are not returned to the authors. The **Faculty of Medicine, South Valley University** reserves all rights of reproduction and republication of materials that appear in the **SVU-IJMS**. Statements and opinions expressed in the articles and communications therein are those of the author(s); the Editors and Publisher disclaim any responsibility or liability for such material. Original articles should reflect the genuine work of the authors themselves. The Editor and Publisher disclaim any responsibility or liability for any conflict of interest concerning the published articles.

Preparation of Manuscripts

- 1. Fonts: Times or Times New Roman 12-point size.
- 2. Justification should be set to full.
- 3. Subtitles should be italic with no underline.
- 4. The manuscript should be written on A4 (210 \times 297 mm) paper, single-spaced throughout and with margins of 2.5 cm.
- 5. All pages must be numbered consecutively and start with "1".

- 6. The text should be arranged in the following order: abstract, introduction, materials and methods, results, discussion, acknowledgments, references, figure legends, and tables.
- 7. The first page of the full manuscript should begin with the title of the paper centered on the page and Bold Title Case (title case means the first letter of each main word capitalized).
- 8. Authors name should start with the Initials Name then the Family name (The first letter of the second name may be used between initial and family names; Jan G. Hengstler) followed by the affiliation of each author.
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- 10. The manuscript should be in Microsoft Word format (.DOC). and the number of words should not be more 10.000 words.
- 11. Figures and scanned objects should be in JPG format at least 300dpi. With width either 8 or 16 cm and length not more than 20 cm.
- 12. The number of figures and table should be minimized as possible, the maximum allowed is 8 figures and/ or tables.
- 13. The manuscript should be written in a good English with no grammatic or writing errors and use US spelling.
- 14. References should follow the Harvard (author, date) system. In the text, the author name is followed by the year of publication (Ali, 2017). In case of more than 1 author use et al., after the 1st author (Ahmed et al., 2017). If 2 authors separate between them by and (Ahmed and Ali, 2018)

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The list of references appears at the end of the manuscript and gives the full details of all used sources. All sources must be referred in a consistent manner.

The details in the references include the following information.

- 1. Author's surname, Initial
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- 6. Starting Pages

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It should be considered an introduction, the body of the article followed by sub-headings by topic, conclusion, and references. It must be submitted a maximum of 30 pages. The review may include up to five tables and five original figures; if the images are not original must be followed by written permission from the authors for reproduction.

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It is a description related to the diagnosis of a rare or the results of a new treatment disease. The content will respond to the criteria of a research paper, presenting the following sections: title in English, authors, the institution of origin, unstructured abstract up to 250 words and keywords in English. It should contain an introduction, presentation of the case report, discussion, conclusions, and references. It must be presented in a manuscript no longer than 20 pages excluding the corresponding figures.

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In this section, the SVU-IJVS readers can post their comments, questions, and replies regarding the published articles. The maximum length is 1000 words, written in (not more than one page).

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A Short Communication is a concise but complete description of a limited investigation, which does not warrant full-length papers and will not be included in a later paper and may report negative results. Short communications should be as completely documented, both by reference to the literature and description of the experimental procedures employed, as a regular paper. The Communications should cover no more than six pages of the journal (about 15 manuscript pages including figures, tables, and references, Times New Roman 12 pt, double-spaced, minimum 2 cm margins). They should have abstract (not more than 50-100 words), no section headings in the body (e.g., Introduction, Materials, and Methods) and describe methods, results, and discussion in a single section. Acknowledgements should be presented as in full-length papers, but no separate heading is used. The References section is identical to the full-length papers

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Each table should be typed double-spaced on a separate sheet of paper and numbered in roman formats consecutively according to its order of citation in the text. A concise title should be provided for each table and should be written above the table itself. Tables should be self-explanatory and should supplement not duplicate the text.

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
